



Nature Notes

We did the Big Garden Bird Watch in the last weekend of January and we saw the following: 1 Robin, 2 Blackbirds, 2 Sparrows, 6 Jackdaws, 5 Blue Tits, 1 Wood pigeon, 4 Starlings, 1 Great Tit, 1 Magpie, 1 Nuthatch, 2 Collared Doves. We definitely have many more sparrows than 2, as they make a considerable racket in our beech hedges, and we often see far more starlings than 4. We haven't yet seen the national results for comparison. We have also been identifying birds using the wonderful Merlin app, run by Cornell University. Last week in our morning round of the garden with the dog, phone in hand, Merlin gave us Greenfinch, Blue Tit, Song Thrush, Robin, Great Tit, Chaffinch, and Woodpigeon. We haven't actually seen a thrush in the garden for a long time so we were really pleased to know that we had one (we have plenty of snails for a thrush to feed on - and we wish it would). We never see Greenfinches on the bird feeders these days: we used often to see them feeding, but apparently many greenfinches died from a disease spread through contamination of garden bird feeders. They must have learnt to leave them alone - and we should all take care to clean our feeders regularly and disinfect them.

The Merlin app also confirmed what we had suspected for some time: that there are skylarks in the fields either side of the church path. Or rather not in the fields but high up in the sky above the fields. You hear the sound but you are unlikely to be able to spot them unless you have extraordinarily good long sight. But it's lovely to hear them and know they are there.

There was a collection of earthworms on the surface of the soil and the path outside Newbottle church one Sunday morning: several worms were stretched out in an extraordinary way. We think they were ordinary earthworms but none of us had seen worms behaving quite like that. No explanation has so far come to light.

We have had a lot of weather recently: several storms one after the other, quite destructively in this garden, with trellis blown over and a tree down, and endless rain at the same time as ridiculously warm weather for February. The floods along the Cherwell valley have been as extensive as we have ever seen, and we have water standing at the bottom of our garden - some very soggy places. The water table must be very high so there is nowhere for the water to go, even in our very free-draining sandy soil.

The snowdrops have been magnificent this year and are just beginning to go over now – spring seems to be galloping onwards with the daffodils beginning to come out. Going into Oxford it's always obvious that everything there is at least a fort-night ahead of us: it is particularly obvious with the flowering trees (*Prunus pissardii* we think) along the Woodstock and Banbury Roads. They are planted in many of the front gardens along those roads – it must have been the fashionable tree to plant when those houses were being built. Oxford is not only south of us but also at a lower altitude which makes a real difference to the timing of the seasons. We have to hope that there won't be any really cold weather to come.

We met the concept of the 'shifting baseline syndrome' recently: a term used by ecologists to describe how as the years pass everyone gets used to our drastically impoverished wildlife. The few birds we see become the 'new norm', and most people no longer notice that they haven't heard a cuckoo in spring.


