

MINUTES OF THE NEWBOTTLE AND CHARLTON ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 15 APRIL 2024 AT THE MEMORIAL HALL, CHARLTON AT 7.30PM

PRESENT: Councillors Linda Baker, Mark Bracey, Jordan Bolton, Wayne Rule and Matthew Walsh.

ALSO IN ATTENDANCE: Theresa Goss (Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer) and two members of the public.

APOLOGIES: Parish Councillors Michael Loggin and Kevin Ridge.

In the absence of the Chairman of the Parish Council, Councillor Wayne Rule as Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council, chaired the meeting.

- **MINUTES** The minutes of the meeting held on 17 April 2023 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.
- **MATTERS ARISING** There were no matters arising from the minutes of the meeting held on 17 April 2023.

6/24 PARISH COUNCIL ACCOUNTS 2023/2024 - The Clerk & Responsible Financial Officer presented to the Annual Parish Meeting, the Parish Council accounts for 2023/2024. The figures had been subject to internal audit and gave an accurate picture of the activities of the year.

It was noted by the meeting that the Parish Council gave an annual donation to the Memorial Hall of £350 to cover the cost of the grass cutting.

Summer is approaching and the preparations for our Summer Fete are now gathering pace. Do save the date and come along. Another indication of the changing season is the increasing interest in the forthcoming Olympic Games, due to be held in Paris in July. You may be surprised to read that there is a connection between the Christian faith and this sporting event.

Perhaps you have seen the film 'Chariots of Fire'? It tells the story of Eric Liddell who competed for Great Britain in the 1924 Games, also held in Paris. Liddell's event was the 100 metres. However, the heats for that event were to be run on a Sunday, and Liddell, prompted by his Christian faith, felt uncomfortable racing on a day that has traditionally been considered a day of rest. Instead he entered, and won, the 400 metres.

The world is a very different place now, and Liddell's reticence to run on Sunday may seem somewhat anachronistic to us. However, this detail matters less than Liddell's motivation. He sought to use all his gifts and talents in the service of God, and having won his gold medal he moved to the Far East and became a Christian missionary. For Liddell his 'life goals' were long-term and stretched beyond the passing glory of sporting success.

In this regard Liddell was faithful to St Paul's vision of the Christian life. Writing in the early years of the Church, St Paul invites the first Christians to view life as a marathon that must be run with perseverance and discipline. These characteristics, if they are directed towards the search for God, can enable us to develop and use our gifts and talents fully. In so doing we may achieve the harmony of mind, body and spirit that lies at the heart of true peace, which is itself a gift we receive when we encounter God.







Nature Notes

It seems very odd to be writing the notes for June: we have gone from winter to summer in a very short space of time. The crops in the fields are growing very fast: one week the dog could be clearly seen above the greenery, the next she could completely disappear into it if her nose went down.

We've written before about the oaks and ashes: 'if the oak comes out before the ash, we shall have a splash; if the ash comes out before the oak, we shall have a soak', meaning the difference between a summer with minimal rain and a thoroughly wet one. Of course it is a nonsense: some plants are stirred into life by temperature, others by the length of the days, so those affected by temperature get going early in a warm spring. This year the oaks are fully out, along with everything else, including the horse chestnuts in full flower, while many of the ashes have hardly started to leaf up. With some of them it may be due to ash dieback disease but they haven't all got it and even the healthy trees are still looking leaf-less.

We have all been bitten by the Blandford fly in the last fortnight, and apparently Minor Injuries Units in Oxfordshire have had lots or victims reporting these very nasty bites. If you haven't met it, it is a species of black fly, 2–3mm in length, which flies low to the ground and is most common during May and June, usually biting ankles and legs. It spends its larval stage in the weedbeds of slow-flowing rivers (and, we suspect, in hardly moving water such as we have had at the bottom of our garden for some months) and when the fly emerges, the female needs a blood meal before mating, and then has to wait before laying 200–300 eggs in a damp and shady spot. So it is a bloodsucking insect which seems to like humans and dogs best. Its bite leaves an obvious puncture wound and a painful swelling which varies depending on how sensitive the victim is to insect bites. One of us reacts badly to insect bites and came up with alarmingly large inflamed swellings on the wrists and arms. Although the flies usually go for ankles and legs those of us who are gardening often have our hands in the soil.

In this country the fly is found in East Anglia, Oxfordshire (I think in this case being so near to the river Cherwell we count as Oxfordshire) and Dorset and was first noticed in the 1960s. During four weeks in the spring of 1972, about 600 people visited their doctors in Blandford, Dorset, with bites, which is why it is called the Blandford Fly. It is also called the Stonesfield stinger or Woodstock Fly in Oxfordshire which is the only other area where it is a real problem, found around Oxford, along the R. Cherwell and the R. Thame. Apparently entomologists have found it in Surrey and Sussex but there are no records of it biting humans there.

We have lots of Red Mason Bees and old stone walls in which they can nest, lay their eggs and supply the emerging larvae with plenty of food until they emerge as adults the following spring. But unseasonally warm sunshine in January can trick the new bees into breaking out of the cells and taking flight to look for food. They will have been deceived by the warmth as there will be no nectar or pollen to feed on. This is another instance of the way that climate change causes species that rely on each other to get out of sync.

On a happier note, we saw our first swifts above us on May 12th and are looking forward to seeing more. And you can tune in to the live webcam of the swifts in the tower of the Natural History Museum in Oxford to see how they progress. This is the longest study of a bird species in the world and has been going since May 1947. (Go to the Swifts in the Tower, Oxford Natural History Museum).
